
This brief, yet equally precise, presentation on how to successfully discuss the issue of abortion is perfect to educate young audiences and small groups.

[Christian Persecution, Citizenship]





Sexuality Mentality by Heather Ruesch



Love Thy Body: Answering Hard Questions About Life and Sexuality by Nancy Pearcey [Gender, Sexuality]





Lady Like: Living Biblically by Rebekah Curtis and Rose Adle



He Remembers the Barren by Katie Schuermann [Motherhood, Adoption, Suffering, Vocation]






Hello My Name Is Single by Adriane Heins




Callings for Life: God's Plan, Your Purpose by Jeffrey Leininger [Vocation]


Mere Christianity by C.S. Lewis [Christian Life, Truth]

The Diary of a Young Girl by Anne Frank [Suffering, Autobiography]




Unwind by Neal Schusterman


Scythe by Neal Schusterman [Abortion, Dystiopian, Young Adult Fiction]

Horton Hears a Who by Dr. Seuss



The Chronicles of Narnia by C.S. Lewis


[Classic Fantasy, Christian Allegory]

The Lord of the Rings by J.R.R. Tolkein





Birthmarked by Caragh M. O'Brien




The Garden of Eve by K.L. Going [Grief, Love, Family]

The Women in the Castle by Jessica Shattuck [Suffering, Motherhood]


This historical novel follows several German widows and mothers as they work to rebuild and survive in the aftermath of WWII, examining both the dark side of the human condition and love of family.

[Suffering, Neighborly Love]


Another beautifully written story of survival in the midst of WWII, Zusak's portrayal of a young girl fighting to preserve life in a world of death is inspirational.



The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society by Annie Barrows and Mary Ann Shaffer


[Grief, Marriage, Love, Adoption, Suffering]

Through extraordinary circumstances, a writer is drawn to a book club on a German-occupied island and finds life, hope, and love in the face of adversity.




Wonder by R.J. Palacio [Disablity, Suffering, Family]

To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee [Racial Injustice, Loss of Innocence]


Set in the early twentieth-century American south, this is an important read for its themes of racial inequality, courage in the face of hatred, and compassion.
