

Evolution: The Big Bang Theory

(This is the most widely accepted evolutionary theory on the origin of the universe. It contrasts God's true creation account.)


In the beginning (before time), the earth was void and without substance.

13.8 billion years ago, **random** particles exploded to create subatomic particles-> atoms -> elements.

3.5 billion years ago, the first single-celled organisms appeared.

Evolutionist Carl Sagan estimated the likelihood for life to appear on any given planet to be 1 in 10 ^{2,000,000,000}.

60 million years ago, the first first multicellular organism emerged.

Instead of the world being created with **order and purpose**, the big bang theory claims the formation of the world was **random and chaotic**, and scientists **can never know the truth** of what happened and why. Unlike God's declaration that **creation is good**, evolutionary theory claims **there are no answers; there is no greater purpose.**

What are the consequences of this view? /

The belief that human beings improve over time and are inherently capable of doing good results in works righteousness, arrogance, complacency, and **cowardice in the face of injustice.** In reality, humans are no better now than they were when Adam and Eve first sinned; we still need Jesus to save and transform us. Our beliefs are not morally right just because they exist in the present day.

What about Christian Evolution?

= the belief that God created the world by setting the process of evolution in motion

Christian Evolution interprets the Hebrew word for "day" in Genesis 1 as a long period of millions of years during which evolutionary processes took place, rather than understanding it simply as a 24-hour day.

...does this matter?

Yes. When we begin to question or change God's Word to explain away miraculous acts in some parts of Scripture, we undermine other areas, including things as central to our faith as Jesus' miraculous resurrection from the dead.
